Chairman visits projects in The Gambia

A successful trip in December 2013 showed schools thriving

At the end of last year, HASTE chairman Judith Hughes went out to The Gambia on a school-visiting trip. While there she was delighted to find the pupils in good spirits ahead of the Christmas holidays.


"I was able to go to two schools' Christmas parties and join in the excitement," she reported on her return. "I visited seven out of eight schools – the one on the north shore is not easily accessible – and also the site of our upcoming project at Sanyang Province, where a benefactor has generously donated land upon which the school in memory of my aunt will be built." At that site three classrooms, a store room and a Headmaster's study as well as a separate toilet block, will be built (see below, right, for progress to date).

Of the other eight schools, all are thriving except one. "The Mariama Haste Nursery School, which we visited for its opening ceremony in 2013, has experienced difficulties after the death of its headmaster," our Chairman explained. "His widow, who was going to take over has been unable to give up her teaching

job since his death because of her need for reliable income." The Trustees have now agreed to fund teachers for a year to enable her to take that step.

The Chairman reported good attendance at each of our remaining schools. "It was a joy to see their smiling faces and witness their progression," she said.





First graduation for Uganda school

Our new school celebrates the end of its first year

In our last newsletter we reported on our work putting the finishing touches to the school in Okwira, and in December two of our trustees, Judith Hughes and Cathie Long, were able to see the first group of children complete their schooling.

"The graduation ceremony was really exciting," the chairman reported afterwards. "We arrived at Okwira and were immediately surrounded by the children who were dressed in gowns and wearing little mortar boards." The ceremony was quite religious, with the mothers leading the singing of various hymns, followed by photographs and a small celebration in a marquee behind the school.

"The food included a cake with one candle in it, to mark the first year of the school and the first graduates. Cathie and I both spoke and I was then invited to present the certificates to the graduates. In the middle of the ceremony the tropical rain suddenly came upon us. Rather than being upset the local people all said that this was a sign of good luck."

Plans for the school continue. In addition to the two classrooms and
